Building Regional Presence Makes Sense

At our November board meeting, we reviewed many of the topics our members shared in their responses to the NCC 2000 questionnaire. In a future issue, we'll provide a complete review of these results but for now I want to discuss just a couple.

NCC has a diverse membership representing virtually every state in the Union. Yet, much of our activities are very Cambridge-centric. This is somewhat logical as this was the home of the factory and is the home of our NCC Museum.

However, we think it is important on many fronts to reach out and reflect our more national nature. The primary reason for this is to increase member benefit and satisfaction, but additionally, it is very important promotionally to build our visibility and solicit new members.

The size of our membership has been stable or declining somewhat in the last several years. Our membership chairman Jeff Ross made an important point at the November meeting - it is not that renewals are lower than previous years, it is that we are not bringing as many new members on board.

To accomplish that, we have to build visibility around the country. In the next few months, we will be soliciting regional representatives for NCC to help with membership and promotion. If you'd like to volunteer to be a regional chairman or part of a committee, please jot Jeff Ross a note care of the museum.

It is likely that we'll start this program in major states or regions - California, Texas, Florida, Northeast, etc. The program would eventually roll out nationwide.

Specifically, we can establish a presence at major glass shows - create display tables, answer glass ID type questions, sell Cambridge books, and yes, solicit new members. This type of endeavor has been very successful for the past two years at the Great Northeast Show in New York, so we know it works. This upcoming March, board member Joe Andrejcak has been invited as a guest to the Western Reserve show near Cleveland. We'd like to make this a club event and have many members there.

Additionally, the nation is full of local DG clubs. If you have one in your area, or even better, are a member of such a group, how about conducting a program on Cambridge once a year. We can make Cambridge club books available for sale at such an event. These arrangements can be made through the club office.

Promotional programs like this are smart. It is beneficial to "spread the word." Our Quarterly Meetings are great, but attendance is often limited. Nearly 50 people attended our program last week and those who didn't missed something special. Ken Rhoads and our panelists were very informative about the histories of Cambridge, Fostoria, Heisey, and Imperial during the Depression era. My thanks to everyone who participated.

I highly recommend that members mark their calendars now for the first weekend in November of 1997. Our November programs are exceptionally educational and not to be missed. Next year we will either discuss additional glass companies or focus on a Cambridge pattern like Caprice (similar to the 1995 program on Rose Point).

We welcome member comments on how to build our regional presence. Let's hear from you.

An additional "out-reach" will be an expansion of a program instituted last year for first-time attendees at the annual convention. We got nice feedback from members, like Emil Kleeman, who appreciated our efforts yet feel we can do more. Bud Walker is spearheading our first-time attendees program and will build a subcommittee of new members to help guide the program. Ready to help Emil?

How It All Began Part V Christmas With Cambridge, Circa 1916

This month's article, for the most part, lets the "pictures do the talking," to paraphrase a familiar commercial. Most of the catalog pages shown this month were originally part of a Cambridge catalog issued about 1916. Those pages showing the No. 2699 line fancy novelties are from the Cambridge Catalog #10 issued about 1920.

While called No. 813 Cut "Sunburst" Design, the pattern also resembles a star and thus most appropriate for use at Christmas. Unfortunately few, if any, collectors will be able to set a table with this pattern since it is seldom seen today. Toothpick holder collectors take note of the piece in the upper left corner of the page.

No. 2729 design is known to Pattern Glass collectors as "Star with Handle" and was introduced during the years 1910-1915. Made until sometime in the early 1920s, it was designated a "Medium Pressed" line. Never named by Cambridge, "Star with Handle" is quite descriptive. The "handle" is readily seen on most pieces and is very prominent on tall items. The star in #2729 has twelve points, including the point that serves as the handle. No. 2656, or Star of Bethlehem, seen in a previous article, has either a six or eight point star.

The page captioned "FOOTED BANQUET BOWLS AND SALVERS" features pieces from a number of lines, a few of which were originally made by another

company. The line Cambridge called No. 2769 was made by Dazell, Gilmore & Levton as the Alexis pattern prior to the molds coming to Cambridge.

Most of the novelty containers shown on the page captioned "GLASS CONTAINERS" were designed to be filled with candy. However, several were intended for liquids, perhaps "adult type beverages." These are the cat and dog, the bottle horn and bottle candlestick. Today, adult Cambridge collectors would be most appreciative if one or more of these candy containers appeared under their Christmas tree full or empty.

Buzzsaw or No. 2699 line entered the Cambridge catalog between 1910 and 1915 and continued to be offered until the early 1920s. As with most Cambridge lines, this should not be taken to mean all pieces in the line were in production for the entire time period. Oftentimes the number of items available tended to decrease as the line aged. The orange bowl and foot and the three-piece epergne as they appear on the different catalog pages is shown with two styles of "foot." The foot used on the catalog page has rings near its "top" while the nineinch sweet pea vase used as the alternate foot does not. Filled with flowers, fruits and nuts, these pieces enhanced vesterday's holiday tables and would certainly do the same today. Lucky is the collector who could decorate a holiday table with one of these pieces.





of the items were: Azurite cat and dog bottles, Peach Blo gold encrusted Hunt Scene pitcher with lid, #3400 line bon bon with "The Ohio State University" enamel decoration, Crown Tuscan two-light candlesticks with gold encrusted Gloria etching, 12inch Crystal #3500 line urn engraved Adonis, and an Ebony frog vase.

The program for the evening consisted of a panel of experts representing each of the major glass companies of the Elegant Glass era. The panel discussed the effects that the repeal of Prohibition and economic conditions had on the glass companies during the 1920 to 1940 time period. They also discussed the various etchings, colors, lines, and patterns that were developed by each company as a result of the changes during that period. Members of the panel and the company that each represented were: Frank Wollenhaupt, Cambridge Glass; Willard Kolb, Imperial Glass; Amy Jo Jones, Heisey Glass; and Ron Hufford, Fostoria Glass. Ken Rhoads was the moderator for the program.

This goblet was made to match the Oneida Silver Company's pattern Deauville.








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
